Che Boys' Brigade Festival of Britain Run

A Message from the Boys of the B.B. to His Majesty the King

EVERY Officer and Boy will desire to share in the spirit of the loyal greeting to be expressed by The Boys' Brigade to His Majesty the King-our Patron-in this year of Festival in Britain.

With His Majesty's gracious approval, the B.B. throughout the United Kingdom will organise a "B.B. Festival of Britain Run," when relays of Boy-runners on five routes, from the extremities of the United Kingdom to London, will carry a Message to the King. The Run will be continued by day and night, stopping only on Sunday, and there will be hand-over ceremonies in hundreds of towns and villages through which the runners will pass. Each route will be timed so as to reach London on the 10th of May for the Reception of the Message by His Majesty. Timed schedules for all five routes will be issued at an early date.

We can look forward to a widespread public interest in this romantic exploit, in which our Boys' youthful spirit of adventure and enterprise is joined with a nation-wide tribute of devotion to their King and Country in this Festival year.

Much care and preparation will be called for from Officers and Boys alike. But we know that they will respond and that the whole project will be carried through with enthusiasm to its triumphant conclusion.

The Message will travel by the five routes detailed below. Each route has been subdivided into Sections under charge of a Section Officer. Section Officers themselves will communicate shortly with the Battalions and Companies involved in their Section of the route.

The routes, from which no deviation can be permitted, will be as follows:-



Each Message will be contained in a silver baton which will be carried by a series of Bearers, and each Bearer will be accompanied by two runners as Escort, one on each side. Escort Boys will not carry the Message, except in an emergency due to the failure of the Bearers. With the Message will be carried a Roll of Bearers to be signed in the presence of an Officer by each Bearer on receipt of

Bearers will be senior Boys, N.C.O.s or Staff-Sergeants, preference being given to holders of the King's Badge.



Bearers and Escort will wear white running costume of shorts and vest with suitable shoes.

A woven Commemorative Badge, as illustrated here, will be worn on the left breast of the vest by Bearers and by the Escort.

Each Bearer, with Escort, will run a distance of approximately four miles. The total number of Boys actually running will be about 2,000.

The timed programme will allow an ample margin for an appropriate Ceremonial Transfer of the Message at important points, when the Message will be read to the assembled crowds.

Civic and Church authorities should be invited to attend the Ceremonial Transfers even where these occur in the middle of the night. Local Mayors or Provosts will thus have an opportunity to express the goodwill of their fellow townsmen to the Boys carrying the Message. Suggestions will be issued regarding a short prayer asking God's Blessing on the Run.

Local newspapers should be advised of this unique event of the Festival Year and everything possible done to ensure the attendance of Press photographers and cinema operators. Police co-operation should also be arranged.

Although only some 2,000 Boys will be actively involved in the Run, it should be arranged that all B.B. Companies in the locality through which the runners are passing should be present in uniform to see the Message to the King go through, and to cheer it on its way, whether by day or by night. At important transfer points there should be a Guard of Honour.

All Battalions and Companies in towns actually on or close to the route will have the opportunity to take part. Those further out who wish to participate in the carrying of the Message may apply to the Section Officer concerned by the 15th of February and an endeavour will be made to include them.

Battalions and Companies will be entirely responsible for any expenses incurred, including the provision of the commemorative Badge for Boys taking part and for ensuring that their Boys, whether as runners or spectators. are conveyed to and from the route at the proper time.

Detailed instructions and precautions will be notified in due course to all concerned.

All ranks of the Brigade will be gratified to know of the interest which His Majesty the King has expressed in the Run. This should be a stimulus to all concerned to play their part in this great exploit.
