



The Boys' Brigade Jubilee Camp

“GLASGOW 1933”

FRIDAY, 8th SEPTEMBER, to MONDAY, 11th SEPTEMBER

One of the features of the Jubilee Celebrations of The Boys' Brigade will be the great gathering of representative Visiting Boys who will be accommodated in Camp, and it is hoped that every Company will be fully represented by the two Boys which each is authorised to send. Only Boys of 15 B.B. age or over in Session 1932-1933 are eligible for selection, and it is recommended that preference should be given to those who are likely to continue their B.B. service.

The Camp will be held at DECHMONT, which is conveniently situated on the outskirts of Glasgow, and in many respects it will be of an exceptional nature. The site which has been selected for it, is a perfect one for the purpose, and the ground available far exceeds the requirements for tentage, recreation, and other purposes. The size of the Camp and its composition will provide an unequalled opportunity for Boys to mingle with fellow-members drawn from all parts. Boys attending Camp will not be called upon to discharge fatigue duties of any kind.

The Commandant will be DR. J. R. C. GREENLEES, D.S.O., an Honorary Officer of the Glasgow Battalion, and Headmaster of Loretto, and he will be assisted by a staff of experienced Officers from the Glasgow Battalion. Included in their number will be three qualified Medical Officers.

The Camp will be open on FRIDAY, 8th SEPTEMBER, and Boys will be at liberty to remain until WEDNESDAY, 13th SEPTEMBER. The nominal charge per Boy is 15s. for a period of four days and three nights, with an extra charge of 4s. 6d. for each additional night. The above sums, of course, do not cover Boys' travelling expenses to Glasgow, but include all charges while they are in Camp.

For administrative purposes the Camp will be divided into Companies, each under the command of Officers who will be responsible for the well-being of the Boys.

Meals will be served in Company Marquees, and the messing arrangements have been entrusted to experienced caterers.

While in Glasgow, arrangements will be made for Visiting Boys to see the sights of the City during Friday. On Saturday they will form separate Battalions in the Jubilee Review. On Sunday they will attend the Conventicle, and on Monday they will be taken for an excursion by steamers on the Firth of Clyde.

Other events of interest are also being arranged, and ample provision is being made for both in-door and out-door recreation.

Every Boy should bring the following :—

Bible.	Pyjamas.
B.B. Hymnal.	Hairbrush and Comb.
Overcoat or Waterproof.	Clothes Brush.
Extra Suit, or, at least, extra pair of Trousers.	Boot Brushes.
Spare Shirt and Underclothing.	Tooth Brush and Paste.
Socks.	Soap.
Extra pair of Boots or Shoes.	Towel.
Handkerchiefs.	Material for cleaning Uniform.
Collars.	Three Haversacks.

Bedding (that is, Blankets, Palliasses, and Groundsheets) will be provided for each Boy, and also all Table Utensils.

A Camp Handbook, giving all the necessary details with regard to arrival arrangements and the daily programme, will be issued in due course for each Boy who is registered.

In order to make the Jubilee Celebrations a milestone in the history of The Boys' Brigade, every effort is being made to ensure the success of this Jubilee Camp, which it is already known will be attended by a very large number of Boys.

All Companies should face and endeavour to overcome such difficulties as may have to be met in order to send their two Boys to Camp, realising that only if this effort is successfully made will the Camp be truly representative of all that is best and finest in the Movement.

Each Boy attending will receive a Jubilee Badge which he will be privileged to wear as an arm decoration during the remainder of his period of service in The Boys' Brigade.
