CBE read the message. The presentation received loud applause from the large audience.



The Duke of Edinburgh's award was adopted at its experimental stage by The Boys' Brigade. The Award's Magazine, The Gauntlet, recorded that Sergeants Ronald Gray and Lindsay Smith from the 1st Lerwick Company in Shetland, became the first BB boys to achieve their Gold award. The Presentation of their awards by HRH The Duke of Edinburgh took place in Dundee early in 1958.
